Our professional staff has been on the forefront of creating a meaningful system of mental health care that strategically focuses on eliminating social barriers and mental health discrimination. With over 15 free programs and services, we create healthy communities for the future.

We promote mental health as a critical part of overall wellness, including prevention services for all, early identification and intervention for those at risk, integrated care and treatment for those who need it, with recovery as the goal.

Vision

We endeavor to build a just, humane, and healthy society in which people are accorded dignity and the opportunity to achieve their full potential free from stigma, prejudice, and other barriers to care and recovery.

We understand racism undermines mental health. Therefore, we are committed to working against individual racism, interpersonal racism, and institutional racism in all their forms.

A Year of Commitment

In 2022, as we began to emerge from two years of a pandemic and stress that none of us could have imagined, the Mental Health Association of Monmouth County embarked on a mission to put mental health, wellness, and prevention efforts in the forefront of our focus. We found ourselves at a crossroads where the urgent need to address mental health challenges, particularly among our youth, was evident. The statistics were alarming, and the call to action couldn't be clearer.

Figures from our national affiliate, Mental Health America, revealed that over 2.7 million youth nationwide grapple with severe major depression, with 60% not receiving the required treatment. More than 1.2 million youth with private insurance are left without coverage. These numbers represent more than data; they represent lives in need of hope and support.

Ever-focused on the protective factors essential to youth well-being, our youth-based programs were instrumental in addressing the critical needs in our community. We organized a county-wide "Celebrating You" wellness event at Bell Works, recognizing all school personnel who demonstrated perseverance and resilience during COVID-19. Youth mental wellness is a collaborative effort, and we thank our partners and board members for their support.

As we turn our attention to adult mental health, the statistics are equally challenging: 50 million adults grapple with mental illness, and 28 million do not receive treatment. That's why our adult programs aim to bridge the immediate gaps within our community.

Across our programs, our commitment to providing evidence-based, trauma-informed, and prevention-focused services encompasses ongoing, no-cost counseling, education, case management, and housing and financial support to individuals and families. We've also introduced a new grief and loss workshop series for older adults and established meaningful partnerships with the faith-based community, ensuring our support network is comprehensive and holistic.

As we extend these efforts into 2023, our message remains the same. The significance of mental health and wellness has never been clearer, and the attention devoted to it has never been greater. We continue our 73-year history of improving the lives of the thousands of individuals we serve each year, but the journey to deliver mental wellness is one we do not walk alone.

For every dollar donated, 94 cents directly fund our programs and services. Our advocacy and collaboration with legislators, aiming to spotlight mental health, have positioned our organization as a leader in shaping key policy decisions in Monmouth County and throughout New Jersey.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to the donors, volunteers, and community partners who make our mission possible.

When a community has strong mental health support systems, it can better cope with and recover from disasters, crises, and traumatic events. By addressing mental health needs at the community level, we can positively impact various aspects of community life, from education and employment to safety and overall quality of life.

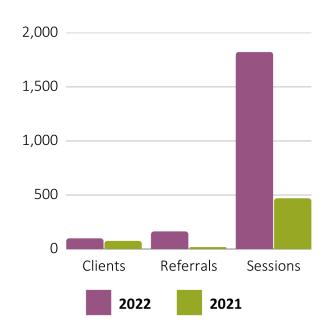

Our **Spotlight**

Emotional and behavioral challenges are normal, and understanding how stressors affect our mental wellness is critical to improving quality of life.

Our Navigate Wellness Counseling outpatient program promotes the integration of behavioral health and physical health, with a focus on early intervention. In 2022, the program admitted 98 clients, received 162 referrals, and performed **1821** sessions.

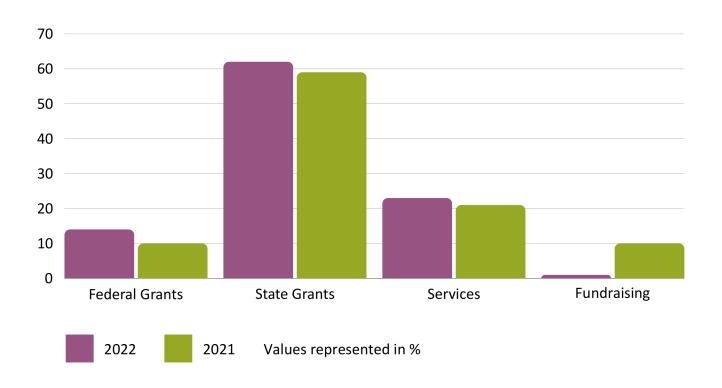
The Mental Health Association of Monmouth County does extraordinary and difficult work. I honestly don't know where I would be without them, and I am forever grateful.

When no one else cared, they did.

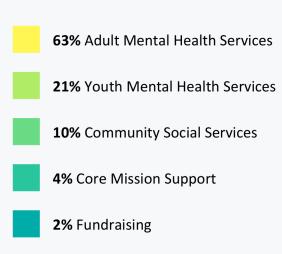


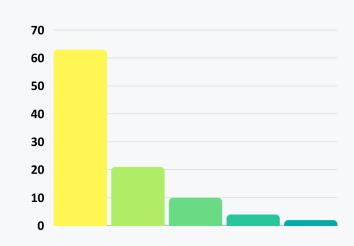
Our Financials

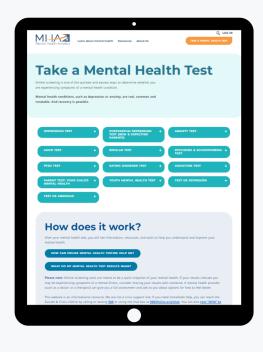
